There are 2 or 3 sight records of this species in Australian waters which have yet to be recorded officially.

- (6) calls none

White-necked Petrel (*Pterodroma cervicalis*): on first sighting the bird, I called out "White-necked Petrel" based on its jizz, but it quickly became obvious that the bird did not have a white neck and the carpal marks were much smaller than would be expected for White-necked Petrel.
