None within 50km of the Finger Point site, however one recent sighting in the SE region 200km NW in Coorong district.

One large shoveler like duck with chestnut on the side, white front (breast), and a dark coloured head and neck with a larger than normal shoveler like beak. I was using a pair of 10x42 Nikon binoculars to note these features. The bird was a male in amongst a mixed flock of waterfowl incl. Pacific Black Duck, Australasian Shoveler, Hardhead, Musk Duck and Grey Teal.

A vehicle drove close by and flushed it with the majority of the flock of 200+ birds from the pond. At this very moment, I managed to zoom in with my camera and snap a photo as it left the water. In this image it shows the dark head, white breast and white stripes on the wings and back. The bird didn't return to the water once everything settled back down. Not seen since.

Please indicate other species with which you think it might be confused and how these were eliminated?

Couldn't be confused with any other species. Very distinctive. Especially as it is a Shoveler and the beak was one of the first things I saw, noting that it was a larger than normal sloping 'shoveler-like' beak.
