Site Location

Harding dam about 20km south of Roeburne WA. The bird was seen at -20.977581, 117.101595, on water. We were birding around the dam, chasing star and painted finches.

Habitat (describe habitat in which the bird was seen): Downstream from a large dam, surrounded by extensive reed beds; rocky hills surrounding it.

Sighting conditions (weather, visibility, light conditions etc.): Sunny, clear day, very good conditions and visibility. Bird was observed through binoculars (10x42, Swarowski). Camera used for photos: Canon 7D with 100-400 zoom lens.

(1) 1 individual

(2) mature bird, male

(3) marginally smaller than a grey teal it was associating with; teal shaped, skinnier in the body.

(4) dark brown crown, dark green eye patch extending well behind the eyes to the back of the neck and with a slight white border on green / Body pale, with a fine grey and white pattern; buff stern; horizontal white area above folded wing, with a black edge.

(5) dark bill, dark eye, legs not visible as it was on water.

(6) not calling

(7) on water, with one grey teal, several coots and plumed whistling ducks.

Significantly smaller than coots, marginally smaller than grey teal.

Please indicate other species with which you think it might be confused and how these were eliminated?

Can't think of any that it could be confused with, as this was a male bird in breeding plumage. It is not a grey or chestnut teal as the colouring and pattern are significantly different (e.g., the head pattern is unique); not a garganey as (again) the head and body pattern and colouring are different – the bird we saw did not have a white eyebrow indicative of garganey.
