Site Location Lake Wollumboola, Culburra NSW.

The bird overwintered as 1cy as described in 1006 at the lake, it then spent the Austral summer in Tasmania as per case 999 and it then undertook its first migration this year doing a pit stop at the lake for a short period of time.

A *Limosa* with black auxiliaries can only be a Hudsonian Godwit. Other key features were also seen, but for brevity's sake I won't go over them again (this is now my fourth sighting of the species in Australia!). It was in a flock of Alaskan Bar-tailed Godwits (*I. lapponica baueri*).

The bird had partly completed its moult into breeding plumage. Given the length of the beak and the orange red plumage rather than rusty red colouration of the underparts, I would tentatively sex the bird as a female.
