## **Submission to Bird Australia Rarities Committee**

Species: Rosy Starlings *Pastor roseus* 

Location: West Island, Cocos (Keeling) Islands, Indian Ocean

Observation Dates: 11 September 2019

#### Circumstances

On 11 September 2019 GC found and photographed a Rosy Starling at the Quarantine Station on West Island in the Cocos (Keeling) Islands. It flushed out of the long grass and landed on the fence along the roadside. It ignored a passing car and dropped down onto the roadside verge and started feeding where it was watched for a while. It was not seen on subsequent visits.

# **Description and Identification**

Refer to the photographs in Figures 1 and 2. The bird was in an adult-type plumage. The bold pink-and-black pattern of the formative and adult plumages is distinctive (e.g. Menkhorst et al. 2017; Rasmussen & Anderton 2005; Beaman & Madge 1998). It may have had two generations of feathers in the wing and on the head, which would indicate it was moulting either from formative to adult, or from adult to adult plumages. Alternately, it may have been in formative plumage with all feathers of the same (i.e. second) generation, but with the older ones being browner and the newer ones being blacker due to hormonal changes during the moult (c.f. Howell 2010).

### **Status**

BARC has accepted five records of Rosy Starling from Australia: from WA (case 437), NSW (cases 520 and 1077), NT (case 979) and the Cocos (Keeling) Islands (case 474) in November to December 2005. This would be the sixth record from the CKI. We are concurrently submitting five records from the CKI including this one (Table 2).
